I. Philosophy

B. St. Patrick School

II. Admission Policies/Notice of Non-Discrimination

A. Admission

Children, who are five years of age by September 15th are eligible to enroll for entrance into kindergarten. Children, who are 4 years of age by September 15th, are eligible to enroll in Foundations of Faith, the junior kindergarten program. Children, who register in the spring, will participate in a spring screening and orientation program. Children are charged tuition. Children, who are not Catholic, or who are members of another parish, are welcome to enroll at St. Patrick School. Everyone is considered a part of the total school community and will be included and expected to participate in all activities scheduled as part of the class day, and all required classes even those of a religious nature.

B. Equal Opportunity

St. Patrick Catholic School is an equal opportunity employer and school. No student will be discriminated against because of his or her race, creed, color, sex, sexual orientation, gender identity, national origin, socioeconomic status, marital status, religion or disability. However, students are required to meet the school's academic and financial requirement(s). As a bona fide religious institution, educational programs governed by the Archdiocesan Catholic School Board of Education may consider a student's religion, sexual orientation and/or gender identity a qualification for enrollment when such qualifications are related to a bona fide religious purpose.

C. Meal Charge Policy

St. Patrick School participates in the National School Child Nutrition Program. Free and reduced priced meals are available to qualified students. Applications are given to each family at school registration, at the school open house, at the beginning of the school year and throughout the school year in the school office. Parents not receiving free lunch are put on a monthly payment plan for meal services at school registration. This prevents students not having a negative lunch account balance.

III. Catholic Dimension/Uniqueness

A. Catholic Atmosphere

Religious education at St. Patrick Catholic School occurs in two major areas: the study of the Catholic faith and integrating faith experiences into the life of each student. Besides classroom instruction in religion, liturgical and sacramental participation is part of our school program. Celebration of the Sacrament of Reconciliation, all school liturgies, and opportunity to participate in Mass during the week are part of the spiritual life of the school. Parents/guardians are encouraged to become aware of and encourage their child(ren) in their faith life. The school can only support what is taught and experienced at home.

B. Prayers, Practices, and Beliefs

A list of prayers and other basic beliefs and practices for students has been developed. Prayers may be introduced at one level and students may not be expected to have them memorized until the next year. However, students are expected to understand these prayers and they will be a part of our prayer at school. We encourage you to also pray with your child at home. (Check list of prayers page 31.)

C. Spiritual Program

The spiritual program of the school recognizes that “to provide a sound academic program which includes emphasis on Catholic teachings within the atmosphere of Christian living” cannot be gained in the formal classroom only. The formal classroom learning is the beginning.

Every Christian has the responsibility to use one’s gifts for the good of the community and to minister as Jesus did. This is the core of the Christian life. Parents/guardians are always invited to the school liturgies. School liturgies are generally at 9:00 a.m. each Friday.

- Sacramental Preparation - Preparation for the first reception of the sacraments of Reconciliation and Holy Eucharist will be given in second grade. Parents/guardians should be directly involved in the religious education of their children. Meetings are held to inform and assist parents/guardians in the sacramental preparation for their child.
- Liturgical Celebration - Students and teachers plan and participate in liturgies. Parents/guardians are always welcome to attend. The Sacrament of Reconciliation is provided during Advent and Lent.

IV. Academic Policies/Programs

A. Copyright

It is the policy of the educational programs governed by the Archdiocesan Board of Education (AB 2510) that all employees, volunteers, and students will abide by the federal copyright laws. Employees, volunteers, and students may copy print or non-print materials allowed by:

- copyright law
- fair use guidelines
- specific licenses or contractual agreements
- other types of permission

Employees, volunteers, and students who willfully disregard copyright laws are in violation of Archdiocesan policy and are doing so at their own risk and assuming all liability.

B. Field Trips

All students are expected to provide a signed permission slip from their parents/guardians and to observe school policies when they are on field trips. Students will leave school, remain, and return together with their assigned group

and chaperone. They may not be excused to leave the group during the trip. Students may bring electronic games, ipods, and etc. with teacher permission. Students and/or parents assume all risk regarding the items regarding loss and/or damage.

C. Guidance

Our guidance counselor from Catholic Charities complements the curricular program by offering support and consultation for students in a number of areas with individual, small group, and classroom sessions.

D. Homework

Homework is encouraged in order to teach students the importance of practice, review, and application. Teachers will assign homework in accord with the age of students. Parents/guardians should not have to instruct students but are encouraged to support the process through questions and suggestions when appropriate. Students are responsible for returning homework on time. Late homework may lower a student's grade. If there are questions about homework, please check students' assignment notebooks and/or home communication folder.

E. Human Sexuality Program

Human sexuality instruction is integrated into the Religion program and is presented from the Catholic perspective in the context of total growth. Parental/guardian support and involvement is an essential component of this program. Information will be sent to parents/guardians as the time for this program approaches. An option is provided for students whose parents/guardians do not want them to participate in these classes. A request for exemption must be in writing to the principal. Parents are permitted to review the course materials at any time.

F. Internet Terms

It is the policy of educational programs governed by the Archdiocesan Board of Education to require the ethical use of the Internet and related technologies by all employees, volunteers and students.(AB 2511) Access privileges may be revoked, school disciplinary action may be taken, and/or appropriate legal action taken for any violations that are unethical and may constitute a criminal offense.

Internet Terms, Conditions, and Regulations

1. Acceptable Use - The use of Internet and related technologies must be in support of education and research and consistent with the educational objectives of the Archdiocese of Dubuque. Use of other organizations' networks or computing resources must comply with the rules appropriate for these networks.
2. Unacceptable Use –
 - A. Transmission of any material in violation of any U.S. or state regulation is prohibited. This includes, but is not limited to: copyrighted material, threatening, violent, or obscene material, or

material protected by trade secret. Use for commercial activities is not acceptable. Use for product advertisement, political lobbying, game playing, unauthorized “chat” or chain letter communication is also prohibited. Other examples of unacceptable information are

pornography, information on bombs, inappropriate language and communications, flame letters, etc.

- B. Acts of vandalism are prohibited. Vandalism is defined as any malicious attempt to harm or destroy data of another user or to damage hardware or software. This includes, but is not limited to, the uploading or creation of computer viruses. Unauthorized use of another’s computer, access accounts, and/or files is prohibited.
3. Privileges - The use of the Internet and related technologies is a privilege, not a right, and inappropriate use may result in cancellation of those privileges. Each user who is provided access to Internet and related technologies will participate in a discussion with assigned staff person(s) concerning the proper use of the network. The faculty, staff, or parent/guardian may request to deny, revoke, or suspend a specific user’s access to the Internet and related technologies.
4. Warranties - The educational programs governed by the Archdiocesan Board of Education make no warranties of any kind, whether expressed or implied, for the service it is providing and will not be responsible for any damages users suffer. This includes loss of data resulting from delays, nondeliveries, misdeliveries, or service interruptions. Use of any information obtained via the Internet and related technologies is at the user’s own risk. The educational programs governed by the Archdiocesan Board of Education specifically denies any responsibility for the accuracy or of permeation and action for the implementation of the global, multicultural, and gender-fair elements of the students’ educational quality of information obtained through its services. The student or parent/guardian will be responsible for any financial obligation incurred through the use of Internet and related technologies that is not previously approved as part of the local budget. G. Media Center

It is the policy of educational programs governed by the Archdiocesan Board of Education to require the ethical use of the Internet and related technologies by all employees, volunteers, and students as set forth below in the Terms, Conditions, and Regulations for the use of Internet and related technologies. Access privileges

may be revoked, school disciplinary action may be taken, and/or appropriate legal action taken for any violations that are unethical and may constitute a criminal offense.

H. Multi-Cultural/Gender-Fair/Global Education

St. Patrick Catholic School offers a global, multi-cultural, gender-fair approach to the educational program. St. Patrick Catholic School is committed to a curriculum that fosters respect and appreciation for cultural and racial diversity and an awareness of the rights, duties, and responsibilities of each individual as a member of a multicultural, gender fair society (ABE 6144.2). The educational program is one of permeation and action for the implementation of the global, multicultural, and gender-fair elements of the students' education.

I. Physical Education Waiver

A pupil shall not be required to enroll in either physical education or health courses if the pupil's parent or guardian files a written statement with the school principal that the course conflicts with the pupil's religious beliefs. (ABE 6144.3)

J. Recess

Students always go outside for recess unless it is raining, or below zero with/without the wind chill. Upper building students are required to wear boots to play on paved areas in the winter. If students want to play in the snow, then snow pants are required. Lower building students are required to wear boots, hat, gloves, and snow pants throughout the winter. Students who do not wear the required items will not be allowed to participate at recess.

For safety reasons, there are definite behavior expectations that will be followed by students when playing on the playground, such as no throwing of snowballs, wrestling on the ground, and etc. Any behaviors that could threaten the safety of students will result in an office referral.

K. School Parties

Each grade may have a short Halloween, Christmas, Valentine, and St. Patrick's Day party. Students may bring birthday treats to pass and share. Healthy snacks and treats are encouraged.

After-school parties are the responsibility of parents/guardians. **Please do not send invitations to school to distribute, since this can lead to hurt feelings if not everyone is included. For the consideration of students' social and emotional growth, it is requested that transportation to social events and gatherings not be handled at school.**

L. School Day

8:15 a.m.	Bell rings at LB and students may go to their classrooms.
8:15 a.m.	Bell rings at UB and students may go to their classrooms.
8:30 a.m.	Classes begin.

3:05 p.m.	Bus riders are dismissed.
3:15 p.m.	Bell rings and walkers are dismissed.

The school doors will not open until 8:10 a.m. each day. Please do not send your student to school before 8:10 a.m., unless they attend the latchkey program. St. Patrick School is not responsible for any incidents or accidents that happen prior to 8:15 a.m. Students who arrive before 8:15 will be sent to latch key and parents will be billed. Parents may wait for their child/children at the entry way for dismissal at 3:15.

M. Special Services

Federal and state rules and regulations state a student must have both a disability and a need for special education services and supports to access and make progress in the general education setting (i3).

St. Patrick's School, Allamakee Community School District, and Keystone AEA Staff (Core Team, Speech-Language Pathologists, Occupational Therapy, and Physical Therapy) *work in collaboration to complete comprehensive evaluations to examine and determine if a student needs specially designed instruction due to an educational disability. These evaluations are completed to determine initial and continued eligibility for special education services (i3).* St. Patrick's Student Assistance Team supports student needs and ongoing reviews of data. The MTSS process should not delay or deny the appropriate evaluation of a child suspected of having a disability and is not a prerequisite for a comprehensive assessment request.

1. Suspecting a Disability

2. Consent and Initial Planning for Evaluation

If a disability is suspected, obtain written consent from the family for evaluation prior to the assessment and plan for the full and individual evaluation.

3. Completing the Initial Evaluation

a. to determine the educational interventions required to resolve the presenting problem, behavior of concern, or suspected disability, including whether the educational interventions are special education; and

b. to determine if the individual is eligible for special education. In Iowa, an individual is eligible for special education when there is:

ii. a disability (a condition that adversely affects educational performance); and

ii. an educational need that requires specially designed instruction.

4. Documenting the initial evaluation through RIOT in an Educational Evaluation Report (EER).

N. Substance Abuse Education

A substance education program is one component of the guidance program. It includes basic student education reinforcing activities/events, family education (through parent meetings), and utilization of appropriate community agencies.

O. Student Assemblies-School Liturgies

All school assemblies and liturgies are part of our school program. When any person is before the assembly to address the group (Mass, Assembly, Pep Rally),

there is to be no talking among students or improper behavior. Shouting, whistling, excessive noise, whispering are discourteous acts.

P. Assessment

Each year students in grades 2, 4 and 6 take the Cognitive Abilities Test. Students in grades 3-6 take the Iowa Assessments. Students in Grade K-6 take the Measures of Academic Achievement (MAP) tests and students in Grades K-6 participate in the DIBELS testing. When test results have been returned and analyzed, parents/guardians will receive appropriate information. In addition, personal conferences are available with parents to go over the results in more detail. Parents are encouraged to set up appointments if they wish more information.

Q. Teacher/Student Class Request Policy

The process of assigning students to classes is one that begins with the school administration allocating teaching staff based on projections of student numbers for the start of the new school year. Student class placement is taken seriously and is initiated through a process involving time and careful thought concerning the best interest of each child. It is the task of the school administration, with the advice and recommendations of the staff, to organize students into a set number of classrooms.

St. Patrick Catholic School respectfully requests that parents honor the professional judgement of the faculty and administration concerning student placement. **Parental requests will not be taken.** You may, however, submit a letter describing your child's learning style or special circumstances of which you feel we should be aware of during the placement process. **Parents may request a particular classroom environment, but not a particular teacher.**

We believe that we have assembled the best teachers committed to ensuring a successful year for your child. Our staff is willing to work with parents to help all students have a great learning experience. If your child is having difficulty after the new school year begins, please contact the classroom teacher and share your concerns with him/her. Our teachers want to work with you and your child to ensure a positive learning experience.

Class lists will not be made public until the night of Open House.

V. Communication

A. Absence

Regular attendance is a key factor in the success of school work. The value of the work missed is difficult to make up by out-of-class work. Doctor/dentist appointments are best made for after school hours or on free days. A student who must, as an exception, be excused for an appointment should have a written notification for the teacher. A written request from the parent/guardian is also required anytime a pupil needs to leave school before the usual time of dismissal. No child is released unless the principal or his/her designee knows the reason for the release and the person to whom the child is released. Parents/guardians must call and inform the school of the reason for an absence before 10:00 a.m. If a student will be absent for an extended time due to illness, parents/ guardians should inform the principal/school. When a child returns to school, a note explaining the absence must accompany the child.

The principal/secretary approves the dismissal of pupils who are ill. Parents or guardians are notified when the illness is detected and are encouraged to call for the child or to make other arrangements.

All students are required to sign in or out before entering or leaving the school grounds at the lower building office. The school accepts no responsibility for any child who leaves without the proper permission.

The Iowa Compulsory Education Law (Iowa Code 299.1) states: “Children in Iowa are required to attend school between the ages of 6 and 16 by September 15th of each year. If a child is at least 4 by September 15th and enrolled in a statewide preschool program, the attendance rules apply to the child.” This law specifies procedures for dealing with attendance concerns.

Archdiocesan Policy 5144.2 states: The Archdiocesan Catholic School Board requires 148 days annually, to be met by attendance for at least 37 days per quarter.

1. Teachers/Administrators monitor student attendance and make a referral to the building principal after the 7th absence during the semester. The student’s attendance record is reviewed.
2. After review of the attendance records, the parent/guardian will be notified. Documentation of the notification will be placed in the student’s cumulative folder.
3. If warranted a home visit is made after the 7th absence in a quarter. This visit is made by appropriate school, parish, and/or community personnel.
4. The Home Visit Report will be completed. After review by the principal, the report is placed in the student’s cumulative folder and a copy sent to the parent/guardian.

5. Following the 15th day of absence in a semester and a review of the student's attendance record is conducted by the local school administration. As per policy 299.1 of the Iowa Code the County Attorney's office will also be notified.
6. All points detailed above are subject to administrative discretion on a case-by-case basis.

B. Communication Methods:

- Dual Parent Report - According to AEB 5124, in the case of a student's whose parents' marriage has been dissolved or a separation of a parent from the home, the name and address of both parents should be on file. Unless otherwise decreed by a court order, information commonly made available to parents of any student in attendance at St. Patrick Catholic School (i.e. notices of school functions, progress reports, newsletters etc.) will be made available to both parents.
*Parent/School Communications - Adequate and clear communication between school and home is essential for the success of the children. Parents should feel free to call or e-mail teachers about student progress or other situations of concern.
- Parent-Student-Teacher Conferences - Individual conferences are held after the first and third quarters. Other parent-student-teacher conferences can be scheduled by either parents or teachers as the need is recognized. Students are invited and encouraged to attend these conferences. Notices are sent to the parent/guardian in advance of the conferences. Each conference generally is limited to fifteen minutes. If you feel your concerns require additional time, we are happy to make a special appointment.
- Progress Reporting - The purpose of progress reporting is to communicate the individual student's learning growth. Effective communication is best established through parent-student-teacher conferences, appropriate phone calls/notes, and quality progress reporting. Such communications necessarily focus on the individual learner in order to determine the performance level in terms of the student's ability and background.

Because growth occurs best in a positive learning environment which enables success experiences for the student, progress in learning is reported and indicated in positive ways. Just as our learning programs are standards-based with defined benchmarks, so too, reporting to parents/guardians needs to be in accord with those standards / benchmarks and in keeping with the student's abilities and needs. In such a way, reporting reflects evaluation of the individual's total growth in terms of potential and self-competition instead of competition against peers who differ in abilities and needs.

C. Complaints

The following policies of the Archdiocesan Board of Education (ABE) should be followed when dealing with complaints. Copies can be obtained from the

D. Early Dismissals, School Closing, and Late Start Procedures

Please listen to KNEI or watch KWWL, channel 7, for announcements of school cancellations. Due to busing, we ordinarily cancel and follow ACSD schedule for make-up days. However, based on local conditions, St. Patrick Catholic School may elect to close due to bad weather or may deviate from planned make-up days. If school is delayed or cancelled, all before/after school programs are cancelled. Latch key is still available after school on early dismissal days, including weather related dismissals. Do not call the rectory or school.

E. Student Privacy Act

In conformity with the Student Privacy Act, and ABE 5125, St. Patrick Catholic School does not send out student/graduate information to any outside organizations without written authorization of the student/graduate.

F. Student Records

A permanent record of each pupil is kept on file at school in accord with ABE 5125. These records are private property and are submitted only when lawfully requested. Should parents/guardians wish to see the records of their child, they should contact the principal.

G. Telephone

Students are expected to have the permission of the principal/teacher to use the telephone before or after school. With the exception of emergencies, students or teachers will not be called to the phone during school hours. Teachers are available before and after school. Messages may be left on teacher voice mail or with the secretary. Students are expected to not bring cell phones to school. If cell phones are needed before or after school, students are to leave them off during the school day.

H. Visiting Classes

Times can and will be arranged for parents/guardians to visit school. Please call us and let us know what times would be convenient for you. You must sign in and receive an ID at the Lower Building office.

VI. Discipline Code

In order to provide and maintain an atmosphere which permits the orderly and efficient operation of the school and which encourages learning and helps students to develop a Christian code of personal conduct, school rules and regulations are in effect. These policies and procedures have been established by the St. Patrick Catholic Board of

Education and administration after consultation with faculty, parents and students. Their effectiveness requires the positive and voluntary cooperation of all concerned.

The knowledge of the rules and regulations, their processes, and their implementation are the responsibility and obligation of each St. Patrick Catholic student. Neither ignorance nor lack of understanding of the rules and regulations will release a student or parent/guardian from responsibility to cooperate with the stated policies. Respect and courtesy should be shown at all times to all staff and students. Students must understand that each teacher and staff member has jurisdiction over any student of the school, regardless of age or grade. All Archdiocesan policies and State of Iowa education laws, as they apply to St. Patrick Catholic School, are to be respected and followed.

A. Gambling

Gambling is not allowed during the school day.

B. Discipline Code

Discipline in a Catholic School is basically a self-discipline directed toward discipleship and service. Discipline is the responsibility of each individual student. It has the twofold purpose of providing for the common good and the individual good. Discipline helps all students contribute to a climate for learning and living. Guidelines are prepared and set by teachers in their classrooms in agreement with the total administrative policies. To assure adequate development and concern for each student, frequent communication with parents by teachers and with teachers by parents is encouraged. All procedures are based on the premises that parents and teachers must work together and support each others efforts. To that end guidelines for expected behavior in large gathering areas have been developed, taught, encouraged, and supervised. A common signal for quiet and attentiveness throughout the school is a raised hand and the “**Give me 5**” statement. The following are expected behaviors for large group areas:

Church

Our goal for church behavior is that students will be quiet, respectful, and attentive anytime they are in the church, so that all may join fully and reverently in the worship of our God.

Behavioral Expectations - We expect the students to:

- enter church quietly and orderly fashion.
- not have anything in their mouths.
- genuflect, kneel in prayer, or sit quietly in the pew, and wait for the service or practice to begin.
- participate fully and courteously in service or practice. Have a book in hand for singing. If approaching or leaving the altar to nod their head respectfully.
- stay seated at the end of the service or practice quietly, attentively and respectfully. Coats may be put on when students rise to leave the church.
- genuflect when leaving and proceed quietly to church exits.

Gym

Our goal is to provide a safe educational environment for all children when they are having class in the gym, while simultaneously restricting excessive noise so that all upper building classrooms may have an educational environment conducive to learning.

Behavioral Expectations - We expect the students to:

- enter the gym in a quiet and orderly fashion at front entrance doors staying to the right.
- meet in the center of the gym, sit down, and listen attentively for instructions.
- participate in activities using normal conversational voices and tone
- stay away from walls that are shared with other classrooms.
- walk around the outside of the gym when heading to or coming from a classroom.
- meet in the center of the gym, sit down, and participate in reflection time at the end of class.
- line up quietly and orderly at the entrance doors. Exit staying to the right.

Playground

Our goal is to provide a safe environment for all children when they are playing at recess.

Lower Building Behavioral Expectations - We expect the students to:

- stay within white painted lines of playground.
- ask teacher on duty for permission, if needed, to go back into school.
- bring toys out with them when they first come out since they cannot go back in for them.
- leave rocks on the ground.
- sit on benches not on table.
- slide down the slide, one at a time.
- use railings for hands only.
- keep hands to self, no shoving, pushing, or wrestling.
- take turns, one person at a time on swings, 5 minute limit.
- not use sleds on playground.
- if ball goes outside of playground once, it may be retrieved, but twice and the ball goes to the teacher on duty.
- when whistle blows, line up by class, walk into building quietly.

Upper Building Behavioral Expectations - We expect the students to:

- bring back into the building any equipment they take out.
- ask teacher on duty for permission, if needed, to go back into school.
- bring toys out with them when they first come out since they cannot go back in for them.
- use appropriate language.
- keep hands to self, no shoving, pushing, or wrestling.

- if ball goes outside of playground once, it may be retrieved, but twice and the ball goes to the teacher on duty.
- conduct themselves in a sportsmanlike manner.
- when whistle blows, line up by class, walk into building quietly.

Lunchroom

Our goal for lunchroom behavior is that students will have a clean, safe place to eat, enjoy their meals and talk with friends.

Behavioral Expectations - We expect the students to:

- say please and thank you as they go through the line.
- keep their tables and floors in clean condition and double check their eating area before they are dismissed.
- have quiet eating time of the first 15 minutes of lunch.
- use soft voices in conversation so only the people near them can hear them after the first 15 minutes of lunch.
- walk back for seconds with tray in hand.
- follow their classroom rules for use of the bathroom.
- walk when dumping their trays; placing silverware, food, and paper trash in appropriate places.
- quietly form a line for dismissal from the lunchroom.

Respect and Courtesy

Respect and courtesy must be shown at all times to all staff and students. Appropriate behavior will be recognized by word, act, or deed by all staff. Also addressed in the classrooms will be Success 4 social skill areas such as:

- How to Follow Instructions
- How to Accept “No”
- How to Get the Teacher’s Attention
- How to Greet Someone
- How to Disagree
- How to Make a Request
- How to accept Criticism/Consequence
- How to Give Negative Feedback
- How to Carry on a Conversation
- How to Introduce Yourself
- How to Resist Peer Pressure
- How to Apologize
- How to Volunteer

Bullying/Harassment Guidelines

Our goal is for everyone to enjoy our school equally and feel safe and accepted regardless of color, race, gender, popularity, athletic ability, intelligence, religion and nationality.

Behavioral Expectations - We expect the students to:

- recognize all forms of bullying (pushing, shoving, hitting, spitting, name calling, picking on, making fun of, laughing at, excluding someone and gossiping.
- value student differences and treat others with respect.
- not become involved in bullying incidents or be a bully.
- report honestly and immediately all incidents of bullying to a faculty member.
- support students who have been or are subjected to bullying.
- be alert in places where there may be less adult supervision.
- work with other students and faculty to help the school deal with bullying..
- provide a good role model for younger students and support them if bullying occurs.

Severe Misbehavior

Severe misbehavior, which seriously disrupts the learning environment, possibly threatens the well being of the teacher or other students, demonstrates defiance, or breaks the law must be sent to the office with a Student Referral Form. Since not all discipline problems are the same, different actions may be taken. Depending on the seriousness of the problem, consequences could include counseling, loss of privileges, detention, behavioral contracts, in-school suspension, out-of-school suspension, or in the most serious of cases, expulsion. The principal has the authority to suspend a child temporarily without asking permission. Physical fighting, foul language, harassment, destruction of property, stealing, continuous failure to abide by classroom, playground and/or school rules will merit a detention, a parent-student-teacher conference where a behavioral contract will be written, or an in-school suspension. (Grounds for out of school suspension includes all, but is not limited to the aforementioned infractions.) Unacceptable student behaviors include:

- Use of drugs, alcohol, tobacco
- Personal injury (bullying, fighting, calling names)
- Refusal to comply with a direct teacher command
- Inappropriate bus behavior
- Possession of a dangerous weapon
- Truancy
- Repeated tardiness
- Repetitive unacceptable classroom behavior
- Habitual late/incomplete assignments
- Vandalism

All consequences shall be carried out according to the ABE 5144.1. (see also Gangs ABE 5133)

C. Corporal Punishment, Restraint, & Physical Confinement/Detention

State law forbids school employees from using corporal punishment against any student. Certain actions by school employees are not considered corporal punishment. Additionally, school employees may use “reasonable and necessary

force, not designed or intended to cause pain” to do certain things, such as prevent harm to persons or property.

State law also places limits regarding school employees’ abilities to restrain or confine and detain any student. The law limits why, how, where, and for how long a school employee may restrain or confine and detain a child. If a child is restrained or confined and detained, the school must maintain documentation and must provide certain types of notice to the child’s parent/guardian.

D. Fire Extinguishers

Any student handling or discharging a fire extinguisher at any time other than in an emergency will be fined.

E. Gangs

In accord with ABE 5133, if a student is suspected or identified as being a member of a gang, initiates or participates in any gang related activity, or is actively involved in recruitment for a gang, any or all of the following steps may be taken:

- Parents/guardians will be contacted immediately and appropriate intervention initiated.
- A behavior contract will be prepared stating the conditions for the student remaining in the school.
- Students may be referred to counseling (personal and/or family).
- Students may be referred to the Department of Human Services or other welfare or child care agencies of the respective county.
- Students may be referred to outside agencies or programs for treatment when use of drugs and/or alcohol is involved.
- Students may be referred to the Task Force on Violent Crime (if applicable).
- Police, Juvenile Court, and other appropriate authorities will be notified of violence and/or illegal activities.

Students may be suspended and/or expelled as outlined in the school/program/Archdiocesan discipline policies.

Parents/students will be held liable and financially responsible for all forms of vandalism.

F. Bullying/Harassment

It is the policy of the Archdiocesan Board of Education and St. Patrick School to maintain a learning environment that is free from sexual harassment and/or harassment of any type of harassment/bullying. No student associated with the educational programs governed by the Archdiocesan Board of Education shall be subjected to any type of harassment/bullying while on school/parish property, at any school/parish function or at a school/parish-sponsored activity regardless of

location. It is a violation of policy for any school employee, volunteer or student to harass/bully a student through conduct or communications as defined below:

“Harassment” and “bullying” shall be construed to mean any electronic, written, verbal or physical act or conduct toward a student which is based on any actual or perceived trait or characteristic of the student and which creates an objectively hostile school environment that meets one or more of the following conditions:

1) places the student in reasonable fear of harm to the student’s person or property, 2) has a substantially detrimental effect on the student’s physical or mental health, 3) has the effect of substantially interfering with a student’s academic performance, 4) has the effect of substantially interfering with the student’s ability to participate in or benefit from the services, activities or privileges provided by the educational program.

It includes, but not limited to:

1) epithets, slurs, negative stereotyping or threatening, intimidating or hostile acts; 2) written or graphic material that denigrates or shows hostility or aversion toward an individual or group that is circulated within or placed on walls, bulletin boards or elsewhere on premises where the educational program operates; and 3) name-calling, sarcasm, spreading rumors, excessive teasing or hazing.

“Trait or characteristic of the student” includes but is not limited to age, color, creed, national origin, race, religion, marital status, sex, sexual orientation, gender identity, physical attributes, physical or mental ability or disability, ancestry, political party preference, political belief, socioeconomic status or familial status.

“Electronic” means any communication involving the transmission of information by wire, radio, optical cable, electromagnetic or other similar means. “Electronic” includes but is not limited to communication via electronic mail, internet-based communications, pager service, cell phones, and electronic text messaging.

The standard for determining whether verbal or physical conduct is sufficiently severe or pervasive to create a hostile or abusive environment is whether a reasonable student in the same or similar circumstances would find the conduct intimidating, hostile or abusive. It is not necessary to show that the victim was psychologically harmed.

Any school employee, volunteer, parent, guardian or student who witnesses or becomes aware of conduct in violation of this policy should file a complaint in writing directly to the victim’s or perpetrator’s teacher, immediate supervisor, principal or the Superintendent of Schools of the Archdiocese of Dubuque. The complaint shall describe the perceived violation, name the perpetrator and the victim, and identify and potential witnesses to the incident.

This policy is in compliance with Iowa Code Chapter 216 and 280.12(2)(f) and ABE policies 2515.1, 2515.11, and 5144.3.

G. School Dress Code and Good Grooming Policy**DRESS CODE PK - 6th**

The dress code is determined by the Board of Education.

On Mass days, which are almost every Friday or Holy Days, students are asked to dress up. This means dress pant, dress shirts, skirts or dresses. Students are not allowed to wear jeans, sweatpants, wind breakers, shorts, hooded sweatshirts, school tee-shirts or inappropriate tops- no spaghetti straps.

The dress code for the Foundations in Faith program and kindergarten through 6th grade is as follows:

- During the regular school day, students are to dress in an appropriate manner consistent with appropriate fit, good taste and decency. Students will be asked to change clothes if the following are noted:
 - Midriff shirts
 - Shirts with spaghetti straps
 - Shirts with slang sayings
 - Shirts promoting alcohol, smoking or inappropriate slogans/characters
 - Clothing that is restrictive, too baggy or loose, dangerous or distracting to the education of other students
 - No caps, hats, or visors are to worn in the buildings.
- In addition to what is mentioned, the principal will use discretion to determine what qualifies as appropriate dress.

H. School property

When school property is stolen or damaged out of carelessness or malice, the student/family is required to make restitution. In addition, the student may face other consequences as well.

I. Search and Seizure

It is the policy of St. Patrick Board of Education to operate its educational programs in a Catholic, orderly environment. Recognizing that the presence of contraband on school/catechetical program property or on the person of a student attending school/catechetical program is not consistent with the above policy, St. Patrick School adopts the policy as stated in ABE 5145.2 which refers to the rules relating to periodic inspection, to the search of students and/or to protected student areas.

Contraband includes substances or items which, if found on school/program property, violate the law and school/program regulations, or are detrimental to an orderly environment at school/program. Contraband includes by way of illustration, but is not limited to, drugs, narcotics, tobacco, liquor, weapons, and stolen property. It consists of substances or items which may cause a substantial disruption of the school/program environment, and/or which present a threat to the health and safety of the students and staff.

Weapons/Guns - It shall be the policy of the St. Patrick Board of Education that weapons and other dangerous objects be taken from students and others who bring them on to the school property or from students who are participating in any school-related activity away from school premises. Parents/guardians of students found in possession of a weapon or dangerous object shall be notified. Confiscation of weapons or dangerous objects will be reported to law enforcement officials and the student will be subject to disciplinary action. Students in possession of a firearm while on school property, coming to and from school or participating in any school-related activity away from school premises shall be expelled for not less than twelve months. Further reference can be found in Archdiocesan Board of Education Policy Manual, ABE 5131.7a

J. Tobacco, Drinking, Use of Non-Prescribed Drugs

Students are not to use, possess, sell, or be under the influence of drugs, beer, or other intoxicating beverages on the school grounds at anytime or while they are on a school sponsored activity off campus. The use or possession of tobacco on the school grounds is prohibited.

These are matters of state law and cannot be permitted in the school, in the immediate school area, or at school related activities, or on school buses.

Student's possession of tobacco, drugs, and/or alcoholic products in school, or at school activities, results in confiscation and discipline. (see also AB 5131.6, AB 5131.61, AB 5144 and/or AB 5144.1 concerning Substance Abuse, Tobacco and Discipline)

K. Computer Responsibilities

Students are to use the school's computers for only the purposes as directed by their teachers. Students involved in changing the settings, formats, etc. on the computer will have their computer privileges limited. Students may be assigned a specific computer in the computer lab and/or a specific laptop computer from the mobile computer lab. If assigned a specific computer, the student is to use only that computer. Use of any other computer may result in loss of computer privileges. The student is to immediately report any change in settings, formats, etc. when logging onto the computer. Failure to report the changes will result in the student being held responsible for the changes and may lose computer privileges.

VII. Extracurricular Activities

A. Activity options

Students have opportunities to participate in:

- Schola- St. Patrick School student choral group, grades 3-6.
- Handbells- grades, 4-6.
- Band- grades 4-6
- Homework Heaven- After school study program.
- Tournament basketball- grades 4-6.

B. Student Activities

We are all identified with St. Patrick Catholic School. What students do outside of school and at school related events is not in all cases beyond the jurisdiction of the school.

C. Public Conduct on School Premises

School sponsored or approved activities are an important part of the school program and offer students the opportunity to participate in a variety of activities not offered during the regular school day. School sponsored or approved activities are provided for the enjoyment and opportunity for involvement they afford the students.

Spectators will not be allowed to interfere with students participating, other spectators, or with the performance of employees and officials supervising the school sponsored or approved activity. Spectators, like the student participants, are expected to display mature behavior and sportsmanship. Therefore the following provisions are in effect:

- Abusive, verbal, or physical conduct by spectators directed toward participants, officials, sponsors, or at other spectators will not be tolerated.
- Verbal or physical conduct of spectators that interferes with the performance of students, officials, or sponsors will not be tolerated.
- The use of vulgar, obscene, or demeaning language directed at students, officials, or sponsors participating in an sponsored or approved activity or at other spectators will not be tolerated.

If a spectator at a sponsored or approved activity becomes physically or verbally abusive, uses vulgar, obscene or demeaning language or in any way impedes the performance of an activity, the spectator may be removed from the event by the individual in charge of the event. The administrator may recommend to the board the exclusion of the spectator from future sponsored or approved activities.

Further reference can be found in Archdiocesan Board of Education Policy Manual, ABE 1251.

VIII. Health/Safety Issues

A. Abuse

Mandatory Reporting of Child Abuse

In compliance with School Laws of Iowa and ABE 4116.3a any certificated or licensed employee of St. Patrick School who has a reasonable belief that a child under the age of 18 has been abused by a person responsible for the care of the child, as defined by law, shall report the suspected abuse verbally to Department of Human Services (DHS) within twenty-four hours and follow the verbal report with a written report on appropriate forms.

Charging and Investigating Allegations of Abuse of Student by Employees

Employees will not commit acts of physical or sexual abuse, including inappropriate and intentional sexual behavior, toward students. A Level I investigator will respond promptly to allegations of abuse of students by employees by investigating or arranging for full investigation of any allegation

and to do so in a reasonably prudent manner.* The Office of Educational Services will appoint the level-one investigator (the principal) and alternate (Associate Directors of Educational Services), and will contract a trained, experienced professional to serve as the level-two investigator. This policy is in compliance with Iowa Code 280.17, School Rules of Iowa 281-102.1—.15(280) and ABE 4116.3a.

B. AIDS

Children diagnosed as having any bloodborne pathogen disease, or with laboratory evidence of infection with a bloodborne pathogen associated virus (HILV-III/LAV) and receiving medical attention may attend classes in a unrestricted educational setting in accordance with ABE 5141.2.

C. Alcohol/Drug Policy

The St. Patrick Catholic School Board of Education develops guidelines that are in accordance with ABE 5144 and ABE 5144.1 on student responsibility and discipline. Students who self-refer for drug and/or alcohol treatment to any member of the faculty, will not be subject to the disciplinary code as long as treatment is ongoing and positive. The board may suspend or expel any student who does not meet this requirement.

D. Asbestos

To be in compliance with the Environmental Protection Agencies (EPA) “Asbestos Hazard Emergency Response Act” (AHERA), we need to notify you that asbestos was used, and is present at St. Patrick School. AHERA was enacted to determine the problems schools may have with asbestos and to develop solutions.

Mark Hogan of CFM Environmental is our asbestos designated person. A copy of the asbestos management plan is available in our school office and at CFM. The most recent inspection was 5/2004

E. Chemical Right to Know Law

The Chemical Right to Know Law requires that all schools in the nation prepare a list of chemicals that are known to be present in their buildings and to maintain material safety data sheets (MSDS) on them. The law further states that all chemicals are to be appropriately labeled, storage areas are to be posted for the hazardous chemicals, and employees that work with the chemicals are to be trained in the safe handling of these chemicals. The school is also to acquaint the local fire department with the location of hazardous chemicals in the school. If you want to know what chemicals are used in the school and where they are stored please contact the principal.

F. Safety Drills (Fire and Tornado Drills)

Unannounced drills are conducted at various times during the year in accordance with Iowa codes. Students are expected to leave in an orderly fashion, without talking, according to the directions of the teacher and return the same way. State law requires four tornado drills and four fire drills each year.

G. Lead in the Drinking Water

During 1991 all schools of the Archdiocese were tested for lead in the drinking water. The test results indicated the lead levels were below the established safety levels. Based upon these results and the rules of the Iowa Department of Public Health no additional testing for lead needs to be done at this time.

H. Prescribed Medication

Dispensing of prescription drugs will be administered by a nurse or school secretary with the written consent of parent(s). A prescription bottle which includes the name of the student, physician, medication, dosage, and a medication schedule must be given to the school. A record of each dose of medication administered will be documented in the pupil's health record.

Dispensing of non prescription drugs may occur, provided the parents have signed and dated an authorization identifying medication, dosage, and time interval to be administered.

It is very important for everyone to work together to avoid the spread of contagious or infectious illnesses. There are times when it will be necessary to keep your child home from school. Do not send your child when he/she has:

- acute cold
- sore or inflamed throat
- temperature above normal (normal temperature is 98.6)
- upset stomach causing vomiting or diarrhea
- a contagious or infectious disease

Following a strep throat or pink eye (conjunctivitis) infection students need to be on medicine a minimum of 24 hours before returning to school.

Medication should be given at home if at all possible. There are times when medicine is prescribed four times a day, in that case, the noon dose may be dispensed at school. The school secretary will be responsible for dispensing medicine.

Only prescribed medication will be given during school and must be accompanied by a written consent from the parent with the doctor's signature. The medication must be in the original bottle and must be clearly labeled as to the name of the student, the doctor's name, name of the medication, dosage, and the time to be given.

Dental cards are to be sent to each school each time your child visits the dentist. The school nurse visits on a weekly basis and conducts the regular eye, hearing, height, weight, etc. exams.

Immunizations: In order to start kindergarten, each child must be caught up in the series of childhood immunizations including DPT, OP, Hepatitis B, the 2nd MMR, and a physical

I. Radon Testing

During 1991 all schools of the Archdiocese were tested for radon. The test results indicated the radon levels were below the established safety levels. Based upon these results and the rules of the Iowa Department of Public Health no additional testing for radon needs to be done at this time.

J. Smoking / Smoke Free Building

St. Patrick Catholic School has been designated a “Smoke Free Building”. At no time will smoking or the use of any tobacco or all forms of non-FDA approved nicotine be permitted within the building or on school grounds.

K. Visitors

Students who request to have a visitor attend school with them should:

- Receive permission from the principal and inform their teachers at least week in advance of the visit.
- The school administrator will contact the cooperating teacher to discuss the accommodation of a student visitor and determine if a visit would or would not be a disruption to the instruction taking place in the classroom. Teachers have the right to refuse permission to a visitor.
- Student’s having guests are responsible for that persons conduct. Visitors are expected to abide by all school regulations and conduct themselves properly. Visitors must dress appropriately and in good taste.
- The student will be invited to visit the classroom for a single day, with the only charge being the cost of a school lunch. Any day that follows will have an attendance fee of \$20.00 per day, not to exceed a total of 3 days during the entire span of the visit.
- **The school administrator has the authority to determine if a longer visit is justified.**

IX. Services**A. Before- and After-School Program**

We do offer a latchkey program before and after school for all grade levels, including preschool. This program offers parents the opportunity to drop off children on their way to work and pick them up after work. The morning program starts at 7:00 a.m. and ends at 8:15 a.m. The afternoon program starts at 3:15 p.m. and ends at 6:00 p.m. If school is canceled the evening before because of weather there will be no latchkey the following morning. If school is delayed due to inclement weather, there will not be latchkey for that morning. If school is dismissed early due to inclement weather, there WILL be latch key. **We request that all payments for the before- and after-school program are kept current.**

B. Bicycles/Scooters/Skateboards

Students are permitted to ride bikes to school. Bikes/Scooters/Skateboards may not be ridden on school grounds or on sidewalks. They are to be walked across the street at the main crossing by the stop sign. Once past the crossing and patrolled area students may begin to ride their bikes. No bikes/scooters/skateboards are allowed on the school side of the street where buses load and unload. The school

accepts no responsibility for bikes parked on school property. All bike riders bring bikes at their own risk.

C. Bus

Transportation is provided by the Allamakee Community School District and through other arrangements. Rules established by these agencies are to be followed as though they were rules of St. Patrick Catholic School. A student may be suspended from bus transportation for inappropriate conduct. Transporting students to school requires the cooperation of bus drivers, students, and parents to assure that high safety standards are maintained. Parents will be notified of any misconduct reported by bus drivers.

D. Lockers

Lockers are to be kept clean and orderly. Please do not put valuables in your locker. No decals, are to be pasted on lockers nor may scotch tape or paste be used for pictures. Masking tape may be used. Lockers are subject to inspection by the administration. Lockers are to be used only by the student to whom they have been assigned. If any damages incurred during the year, the damage will be charged accordingly. Interior locker decorations must be in good taste representing student and school values. Sixth grade students will be issued a locker and a lock to use each year. The locker and lock remain the property of St. Patrick School.

E. Lost and Found

All students need to be taught to be responsible for their personal belongings. An effort is made to find the owners of articles of clothing, lunch boxes, play equipment, etc. There is a box of found articles if parents wish to check it. Periodically, any unclaimed items will be given to the needy.

F. Lunch

The Federal Hot Lunch Program provides lunch/milk for all students. Some families may qualify for free or reduced price lunches. Free and reduced lunches are determined by income and an application must be filled out. Applications can be attained at the lower building office. We encourage all families to apply who feel they might qualify. Lunch accounts will be billed the previous month and must be paid to date in order for a student to participate in the hot lunch program. If there is no money in the account, the school will operate under the assumption that the family wishes to provide a cold lunch for the student. Please send an additional \$.25 with students who wish to have milk with their cold lunch or a second milk with their lunch.

G. School Supplies

A listing of school supplies recommended is posted on the web site (www.stpatswaukon.com) and is available during fall registration days.

H. Textbooks

Textbooks are provided to all students. Undue wear, damage, or loss will require payment at the end of the school year. Books belonging to the school are to be covered at all times.

I. Tuition Tax Credits

Expenses incurred by parents may qualify for tuition tax credits. Information is distributed annually, usually at the end of the calendar year.

J. Tuition & Fees

Tuition and fees may be paid by semester in August and December. Monthly installments will be automatically withdrawn from your bank account. All accounts must be paid in full by May 31st of the current school year.

The school's budget for the current school year is determined the previous year with input from the parish council and discussion by the Board of Education. Income is derived from three main sources: tuition, parish subsidy, and third source income, which includes donations, endowment funds, and etc. Every penny is accounted for and used to benefit our students. Tuition payments are an important part of the budgeting process and relied upon for much needed income. Therefore, it is important that tuition and lunch payments are made in a timely manner. Accruing an excessive outstanding balance places a burden on the school/parish and the parents. If timely payments are not made, the parents, having assumed responsibility for payment, carry a financial burden that may grow beyond their capabilities to manage. The school, in need of the income to maintain a balanced budget, must have a method of collecting the funds. If financial assistance is necessary, parents are requested to complete a tuition assistance form. Assistance is available for those families who cannot pay the full amount for tuition and fees.

The steps that will be taken if a family gets behind in payments are:

- A letter will be sent reminding parents of their financial obligations and offering options for making payments.
- A letter will be sent requesting contact with the business or administrative offices to formulate a viable payment plan.
- A letter will be sent to parents outlining the steps that will be taken if payment is not received prior to May 25th.
- If payment has not been received by May 30th and parents have not attempted to make any effort towards payment, legal action will be taken.

K. Tuition Assistance/Grants

No one should be denied a Catholic education because of financial need. Assistance is available for those families who cannot pay their full fees and/or tuition. Application for the Student Tuition Organization is encouraged. Please

ask the principal for further information. Confidentiality is maintained.(ABE 3240.1)

B. Volunteer Aides

XI. Prayers, Basic Beliefs, and Practices

Please know that prayers may be introduced at one grade level and students may not be expected to have them memorized until the next year. However, know that the students are expected to have an understanding of these prayers and they will be part of our prayer at school. We encourage you to also pray with your child at home.

Prayer, Beliefs and Practices

The following Prayers, Beliefs and Practices are found in the Compendium - Catechism of the Catholic Church ©2006 and the United States Catholic Catechism for Adults ©2006. Prayers are organized from the most foundational to more complex; Belief and Practices are alphabetized. The Prayers, Beliefs and Practices have been subdivided into the grades in which it is recommended that they are to be taught. While there is no definitive statement which assigns the Prayers, Beliefs and Practices to the various grade levels, the Prayers, Beliefs and Practices coincide with suggestions and recommendations as presented in “By Their Fruits You Shall Know Them. . .” (NCEA) and Sowing the Seeds of Faith (NCCL) which reflect developmentally-appropriate levels.

This entire listing is also consistent with the following publications of the Archdiocese of Dubuque: the Catholic school religion standards/grade level expectations developed by the Office of Catholic Schools and the Basic Elements of Catholic Faith from the Office of Catechetical Services.

While other prayers of cultural/liturgical significance may be recommended and used as designated by the local site, students are expected to have an understanding of the Prayers, Beliefs and Practices contained herein, and they will be part of prayer in the school and religious education programs.
